Directors Report

National Families Week is held every year between 15 and 21 May. Over a hundred thousand people get involved in hundreds of events during the Week in Australia's biggest celebration of families in all their diversity. We are proud to have been involved and show you all how much we appreciate you and your family by providing little opportunities to make your week more relaxed. We hope that you also had opportunities to spend time with your immediate and extended family and celebrate the importance of family.

The Weddin Mobile Preschool was visited by a Department of Education Authorised Officer. Her role was to visit both Caragabal and Quandialla and assess and support the Service to go on the register for assessment and rating. Up until now Mobiles have been "Out of Scope", which means we have been under supplementary regulations as well as not been eligible for assessment and rating. Our visit was very positive, with much praise given about the governance, leadership, and operation of the Service. The team are looking forward to the challenge of assessment and rating in the future, it is a great opportunity to be validated for the good work we do in Caragabal and Quandialla.

HOW SICK IS TOO SICK? Like adults, children sometimes wake in the morning wishing they could have a day off from usual routine. After (again like adults) by the time breakfast is over, they are feeling better and are ready to face the day ahead. On occasion, however, children should stay at home, in their own interest and the interest of other children and educators. You should keep your child at home if he/ she is:

- unable to participate in the day without medication
- ✤ has a high temperature in the morning, and feels feverish
- has a runny nose and a cough
- has signs of conjunctivitis red and/or inflamed eyes with discharge
- has any rash or skin irritation you cannot identify
- has impetigo "school sores"
- has diarrhea
- ✤ has been vomiting during the night
- ✤ is unusually tired, pale, irritable, or lethargic
- has an eye, ear or throat infection and is on antibiotics. Your child should stay at home until he/she has had the medication for at least 24 hours

We are doing our best to ensure your child's safety and wellbeing in our environment. Our policies and practices mean educators are always cleaning surfaces, provisions and practising good hygiene, and so are the children who attend. Please speak with an educator at the Service, during work hours, if you have any concerns about your child's health and safety.

We participated in the National Workforce Census. The Census is an opportunity to identify our highly skilled and capable workforce, which is essential in fostering high-quality services and achieving the best outcomes for children.

Finally, in the six months that I have been in the Director role, I have been subjected to a level of negativity and criticism that has been promoted by an anonymous group of community members that have made this position untenable. As a result, I have resigned from my position as Director, and as such, Thursday 3rd June was my last day at the Service.

Board Report

The Board of Directors are saddened to accept the resignation of our Director, Natalie Rush. The Board works very closely with the operational leadership team, thus feel well placed to provide some context around her time at the service and this decision. For the past six months, Nat has worked tirelessly to strive for excellence in early childhood education and care. She inspired educators, had difficult conversations with educators to address performance issues, made difficult decisions in the best interest of the service, and achieved a higher level of quality care and compliance that the service has ever experienced. All early childhood education services are required to comply with regulation and legislation. Therefore, Nat prioritised this in her first six months. Without compliance, the service cannot operate and would be closed.

The circumstances of Nat's resignation have been addressed in the Director's report and more detailed communication has been sent directly to our stakeholders via email. Any questions about this matter need to be directed to any of the Board of Directors: Rachel Conron, Amanda Protheroe or Belinda Mawhinney.

At the AGM in September, all 3 positions on the Board of Directors will be available. This is an opportunity for 3 stakeholders to be elected by members of the association. Over the past three years, the Board have made decisions to significantly reduced the demands on families' need to volunteer. We believe this will make the operations of the service more sustainable into the future. If you possess professional skills that would be valuable to the ongoing operations of the service, then volunteering your time and expertise is a valuable way in which you can support the leadership team to deliver a high quality early childhood education and care service. This a great opportunity for a skilled professional who is committed to supporting our only early childhood education service.
