From The Director's Desk

Dear Parents & Families,

Firstly, I would like to personally thank you all for all your welcoming messages, emails, and conversations that I have had with you over the last week of my time here at our wonderful service. It has made my transition back into work and Grenfell life very smooth and it is really testament to our beautiful community around us.

As I am sure you are all aware that our current lockdown period for Regional NSW as been extended to at least 11:59pm on the 10th of September 2021. As per NSW Government advice, our service is declared to be an essential service for our community and is allowed to

have their doors open for business.

It is still the current advice that for parents and families are encouraged to keep their children at home unless they require our services of education and care. If you do require our services, please know that our doors are open, and we would love to support you through this difficult time. Please be aware that no children will be refused access to our service. We are definitely missing everyone that is be cared for at home and we cannot wait for everybody to be back soon!

As per our COVID management and safety plan, we are under strict advice from the NSW Government of our policies and procedures. As it remains, our drop off and pick up procedures remain the same, scan the Service NSW QR Code, and ring the doorbell and one of our amazing educators will assist you with your child to enter and exit the service. Please also ensure that you are wearing a face mask when your are dropping off and collecting your child/ren.

In association with our COVID management and safety plan, if your child displays any of the symptoms of COVID (runny nose, fever, cough, sore throat, etc), an educator will contact parents to come and collect your child to maintain our safety for both children and educators at the service. We understand that many illnesses have these symptoms, but for us as a service, we need to be compliant with our COVID safety and management plan. Please also be aware any fever, children need to be excluded for the following 24 hours from the service and for diarrhoea, the children are to be excluded for 48 hours.

   bag we have limited spare clothing here.
- Please ensure you pack enough nappies, we suggest roughly 5
  nappies a day we have limited sizing and spare nappies
  available.





# **Star Room**

Hello to all our beautiful Star Room families,

As our attendance has been low, we have revised our program to facilitate child and family participation from home. Online links have been provided on the program so they can be used to access some of the content we are sharing here at the service.




Through the month of August children have engaged in various stories and experiences based on rhyme and repetition. This fosters early literacy skills and the development of vocabulary. Children have shown a great interest in this, and it is evident in their play. With child-initiated experiences

#### such as storytelling and role-playing familiar stories such as 'Three Billy Goats Gruff'.



We will be exploring FMS (fundamental movement skills). These skills come with guidance and practice. Over the past month we have been engaging in the skill of striking. Pool noodles and soft balls or balloons are a great way to foster the skill of striking. We are continuing to support FMS with a focus on hopping and jumping through music experiences and games over the next program.







Over the last month we have participated in Science Week. We have explored some exiting chemical reactions through hands-on science experiments focusing on concepts such as cause and effect, comparing, observing, and predicting. The Star room children have been showing a strong interest in making volcano's and exploring the chemical reaction of bi-carb soda and vinegar. Noah and Eddie are consistently asking "can we make volcano's".

As Child protection week is coming up next week, we will be sharing Australia's Biggest safety lessons featured on the Daniel Morcombe foundation web page. While it may feel uncomfortable having these conversations with children, research suggests the earlier we can have these conversations about keeping our bodies safe the more empowered children will feel to report or potentially avoid becoming victims of varying forms of abuse. "Personal safety education provides children with the knowledge they need to recognise potentially unsafe situations or people and know how to respond. It is part of preventing abuse and keeping kids safe." Daniel Morcombe Foundation 2019.

As we have been in lockdown due to Covid Beatrice, and her sister Georgina dressed up at home and sent us in a photo. The children have been participating in craft experiences to strengthen their fine motor skills. This has been through cutting with scissors and collage and rubber band painting. Rubber bands were placed around a box which had paint on them. The children then had to pull the bands up flicking the paint onto the paper. At first the children only slightly pulled the band

and then they used more force. Fine motor skills are important for hand control when learning to write. Some of the children are showing an interest in writing their own name on craft.

#### Loose Parts in Action

Loose parts are open-ended materials that can be moved, combined, taken apart, redesigned, linedup and more. Loose parts allow children to do the thinking, which develops problem solving, imagination and persistence.



During third term the children have started to utilise our loose parts in their play. Cardboard tubes have been used as sausage rolls, gum nuts as meatballs, pop sticks as spaghetti, octagons were used at tomatoes and the blue and orange wooden coffee pods were used in cups as water and orange juice. The magnetic posts and balls became chopped up meat for pet dinosaurs. The children have also used loose parts as dog food and cat food to feed their pets (each other).





If you have anything at home you think we could use, please send it in, or contact us if you are unsure. If you have any plastic tubes – large or small – please send them in as well, they would be a good addition to outdoor play.
